

WMTRC Trail Short: Norway and France take home gold medal

On the second race day of World Mountain and Trail Running Championships Innsbruck-Stubaier 2023 (WMTRC), Norwegian [Stian Hovind Angermund](#) defended his title and took home gold in the men's Trail Short. The race started at the Landestheater (Tyrol State Theater) in Innsbruck and passed through alpine terrain, with the Kalkkögel being one of the highlights on the way to the finish line in Neustift im Stubai. Among the women, [Clementine Geoffray](#) from France took home the victory.

The second day of racing at the 2023 World Mountain and Trail Running Championships began at 9 a.m. local time on Thursday, June 8, in downtown Innsbruck, Austria. Women and men took off together to reach the finish line in the Stubai Valley after 45 kilometres and 3121 meters.

The course itself proved challenging, with temperatures in Innsbruck up to 23 degrees Celsius. In the end, due to adverse weather conditions, the race was interrupted at the 35th kilometre, and the last 37 runners were unable of continuing.

2023 Trail World Championships Short Trail Women's Race

For the second day in a row, it was the women's race that was decided in the final stage.

French runner **Clementine Geoffray** won the Trail Short for the women after an extremely strong finish, crossing the finish line before **Judith Wyder** from Switzerland, who dominated the race over long periods. Third place goes to **Theresa Leboeuf**, a fellow Swiss.

Jennifer Lichter from the USA took fourth place with a time of 5:11, and **Emilia Brangefält** from Sweden finished fifth with a time of 5:15.

As was the case with the women's Vertical, there was a nerve-wrecking duel for victory in the Trail Short. After the first kilometres, Swiss runner Judith Wyder took the lead and kept leading the field for a good 30 kilometres. Clementine Geoffray was able to steadily reduce the gap as the race progressed over 45.2 kilometres and 3,132 meters in altitude. After 4 hours and 13 minutes she passed her opponent just a few meters below the highest point of the route on a narrow path, keeping her lead during a strong downhill to Neustift im Stubaital, in the end even taking two minutes off Wyder. The two frontrunners built a big gap

on the rest of the field. It was over 14 minutes before third-place Theres Leboeuf of Switzerland finished next in 5:09.

Clementine Geoffray is overjoyed and obviously proud to celebrate her first WC title: *“It was incredible. I started off at a fast pace, but I felt good. Once I got overtaken, I started to have doubts. But the last climb wasn’t all that steep, and I saw Judith ahead of me, which really motivated me to follow her as I knew I could still pass her.”*

France won team gold in a combined 15:35. Switzerland was second with 15:44, and the U.S. women earned bronze with 15:54.

2023 Trail World Championships Short Trail Men's Race

In a gripping race over 3,121 vertical meters on 45 kilometers from Innsbruck to Neustift im Stubaital, Norwegian **Stian Angermund** defended his title with a time of 4:19 hours, coming in first before Briton **Thomas Roach** and Italian **Luca del Pero**.

Angermund and Roach took the lead soon after the start in the centre of Innsbruck, running the first 14, 15 kilometers in a trio with Roach's compatriot Jonathan Albon before Angermund was able to pull away. The route to the Kalkkögel leads over slippery fields of snow, and Angermund managed to extend his lead to more than 1.5 minutes. What made the Norwegian's feat even more special: He ran through every single resupply camp without stopping for food or drink. For a moment, this seemed to have taken its toll as Angermund slowed down to a walking pace just before reaching the route's highest point at the Starkenberger hut.

On the downhill towards Neustift, Angermund accelerated once again and was able to keep his competitors at bay, allowing him to run down the final switchbacks to Neustift without pressure and to successfully defend his title from Thailand. Crossing the finish line 2:18 minutes later, Roach came in second ahead of Luca del Pero, with a 3:04-minute deficit.

Thibaut Baronian and **Jonathan Albon** of France and Great Britain finished fourth and fifth, respectively, with times of 4:25 and 4:26.

Stian Hovind Angermund on winning the race: *“We started off at a very fast pace. It went well from the very beginning, and it only got strenuous during the last climb. The last downhill was challenging yet fun. Winning the title was my main goal for this year and I am very happy to have achieved it.”*

Great Britain took first place with a combined time of 13:18, and its first three athletes placed in the top eight. Italy took second place with a combined time of 13:26, and France won the team bronze medal with a time of 13:34.
